### **SUMMARY**

#### **Issue for Consent Agenda**

Should the Board of Regents approve the updates to the attached list of Regents Physician Shortage Areas (Attachment A), as recommended by the New York State Department of Health (DOH), for the 2019 Regents Physician Loan Forgiveness Award Program application cycle?

#### **Reason for Consideration**

Required by State statute.

#### **Proposed Handling**

This item will come before the Full Board at its February 2019 meeting where it will be voted on and action taken.

#### **Procedural History**

Not applicable.

#### **Background Information**

In 1987, the Board of Regents approved a system for identifying and designating areas of physician shortage for purposes of the Regents Physician Loan Forgiveness Award Program. In September 1995, the Board decided to update this shortage area list annually.

Each year, DOH recommends updates to the list of Regents Physician Shortage Areas. These updates include modifications to the following Health Professions Shortage Areas (HPSAs): Primary Care, Facility Physician, State Facility and Mental Health Professions.

This year, DOH recommended that several significant changes be made to the list of Regents Physician Shortage Areas. These changes reflect changes made by the United States Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) to modernize the Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) data, on which the DOH data is based, as well as recommendations by DOH to modernize the Regents Physician Shortage Areas designations. These changes are as follows:

- Include Rural Health Clinics in the Facilities Eligible for Primary Care and Mental Health Shortage Area Designations category to increase access to primary care services for Medicaid and Medicare patients in rural communities;
- Change the methodology used to qualify hospitals for Regents Program placements in order to increase the number of eligible smaller and rural hospitals;
- Eliminate non-primary care (specialty care) shortage areas. The Regents Physician Loan Forgiveness Award Program gives awards to only those physicians who have or will complete residency training in family practice, pediatrics, internal medicine, emergency medicine, obstetrics or psychiatry. The new proposed Regent Physician Designated Shortage Areas list would, therefore, not include data for specialties not included in the program;
- Exclude United States Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Hospitals. The VA system has a service obligated program that covers its physicians. In addition, physicians employed by the VA are not required to be licensed in New York State;
- Exclude federal prisons from eligibility. Prisons are not designated as HPSAs by HRSA;
- Make the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) treatment programs categorically eligible. The opioid epidemic both nationally and in New York State is straining an already overtaxed behavioral health system. Behavioral health providers continue to struggle with the recruitment and retention of qualified practitioners, especially in rural and inner-city areas. Although the state and federal governments are targeting resources to address the opioid crisis, these recruitment and retention issues make it difficult to ensure appropriate access to ongoing treatment. OASAS funds treatment programs to address addiction behavior, including opioid abuse. These programs include crisis services, inpatient treatment services, opioid treatment programs, outpatient services, and residential services (including certain residential programs that have treatment components). There are over 300 programs that could potentially qualify for the Regents Physician Loan Forgiveness Award Program if it was expanded to include those programs providing opioid treatment;
- Add language to exclude physicians who are fulfilling an obligation under any state loan repayment program which overlaps or coincides with the Regents Physician Loan Forgiveness Award Program service obligation; and
- Provide web links to (HRSA) list of HPSAs and geocoding websites rather than listing them by census tract, township, or county. HRSA is currently undertaking a

project to modernize shortage designations. This project includes automating procedures and using standardized data sets as part of the designation process. As such, DOH is in the process of updating most of its current Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSA) designations. Under the current process, physicians who are applying for the Regents Physician Loan Forgiveness Award Program and interested in providing services in urban areas must look up their census tract online and cross reference the list of primary care RPSAs by county to determine their eligibility. This is an unnecessarily complicated process, especially when there are easy-to-use address “look-up” geocoding sites available to determine if an address is located within a HPSA.

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## Regents-Designated Physician Shortage Areas (RPSAs)

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## **GENERAL INFORMATION REGARDING REGENTS-DESIGNATED PHYSICIAN SHORTAGE AREAS (RPSAs) IN NEW YORK STATE**

### **Overview**

Regents-Designated Physician Shortage Areas (RPSAs) consist of both Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) as approved by the federal Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and designated health care facilities within New York State. Regents Physician Loan Forgiveness Award Program (Regents Program) placements must be located within these defined areas and/or at these designated health care facilities.

### **Primary Care, Emergency Medicine and Mental Health Regents Physician Shortage Areas**

For primary care or emergency medicine physicians not practicing at a designated health care facility, proposed practice sites must be in primary care HPSAs. For psychiatrists not practicing at a designated health care facility, proposed practice sites must be in mental health HPSAs. To be eligible for Regents Program placements, HPSAs cannot be listed as withdrawn.

HPSAs are defined by whole counties, one or more townships within rural areas, or one or more census tracts within urban areas. In order to determine if an address is in a primary care or mental health HPSA, applicants can use the search tool found at: <https://data.hrsa.gov/tools/shortage-area/by-address>. If the proposed practice site is in a HPSA, the name and status (among other things) will be listed under the appropriate type.

### **Facilities Designated as Regents Physician Shortage Areas for Primary Care Physicians and Psychiatrists**

This section lists individual facilities, including federally qualified health centers (FQHCs), FQHC lookalikes, and rural health clinics by county that qualify for Regents Program placements for either primary care physicians or psychiatrists. Please note that a small number of these facilities do not directly provide behavioral health services and do not qualify for psychiatric placements.

### **Other Facilities Designated as Regents Physician Shortage Areas for Primary Care Physicians and Psychiatrists**

Other types of facilities designated by HRSA are also eligible for Regents Program placements for primary care physicians and psychiatrists. These designated facilities include "Native American/Tribal Facility/Population," "Other Facility," (eligibility depends on type of designation) and "State (and County) Mental Hospital" (psychiatrists only) and can be found at: <https://data.hrsa.gov/tools/shortage-area/hpsa-find>.

Treatment programs funded by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) are also eligible for Regents Program placements and include crisis services, inpatient treatment services, opioid treatment programs, outpatient services, and residential services, when those residential services have treatment components. Applicants can identify OASAS treatment programs for potential placement sites at <https://oasas.ny.gov/providerdirectory/>.

### **New York State Operated Facilities Designated as Regents Physician Shortage Areas for Primary Care Physicians and Psychiatrists**

This section lists New York State facilities operated by the Office of People with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD), the Office of Mental Health (OMH), and the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS). These facilities are eligible for Regents Program placements for either primary care physicians or psychiatrists.

### **Hospitals Designated as Regents Physician Shortage Areas for Primary Care Physicians, Emergency Medicine Physicians, and Psychiatrists**

This section lists hospitals by county with at least 1,000 annual discharges, of which 25% are from patients who are self-pay, who are Medicaid beneficiaries, or who are supported through the DOCCS that are eligible for Regents Program placements. These hospitals are eligible for primary care, emergency medicine, and psychiatric physician placements.

### **Critical Access Hospitals Designated as Regents Physician Shortage Areas for Primary Care Physicians, Emergency Medicine Physicians, and Psychiatrists**

This section lists critical access hospitals by county that are categorically eligible for Regents Program placements for primary care, emergency medicine, and psychiatric physicians.

### **Providers Not Eligible**

Physicians who are fulfilling obligations through HRSA's National Health Service Corps (NHSC) loan repayment or scholarship programs, through New York State Doctors Across New York (DANY), or through DANY OMH Psychiatrist Loan Repayment program are not eligible for Regents Program placements.
