**Issue for Consent Agenda**

**Procedural History**

Section 6506(5) of the Education Law and Section 24.7 of the Rules of the Board of Regents authorize the Regents to waive education, experience and examination requirements for a professional license as well as to confer the degree Doctor of Medicine.

**Background Information**

There are four licensing petitions and 37 requests for the conferral of the degree Doctor of Medicine for review and approval.

## **Recommendation**

It is recommended that the Regents approve the recommendations of the Committee on the Professions regarding licensing petitions.

## **Timetable for Implementation**

Approval of the Committee on the Professions' recommendations will be effective September 16, 2014.

Petition for: Acceptance of education.

Statement of Problem: Regulations of the Commissioner require an applicant for licensure in dentistry to complete an acceptable preprofessional education program of at least two years in length (including courses in general chemistry, organic chemistry, biology or zoology, and physics) and an acceptable professional dental education program of at least four years in length, for a total of six years of preprofessional and professional education.

Dr. Bizoumis completed a five-year combined preprofessional and professional dental education program at University of Athens Dental School in Athens, Greece. Therefore, he lacks one year of education which is in the preprofessional area.

However, Dr. Bizoumis also completed 30 semester hours of college-level examinations: 9 semester credits from CLEP through the College Board, and 21 semester credits from DSST through Prometric, in May 2014. The State Board for Dentistry recommends that these studies be considered to fulfill the remaining one year of required preprofessional education.

Additionally, an applicant who completed a program of dental education in an unregistered or unaccredited dental school must complete the required two academic years of study in an accredited dental school program, culminating in certification that the applicant has achieved the level of knowledge and clinical proficiency expected of a graduate of that school. Dr. Bizoumis also completed two years of advanced study in Pediatric Dentistry at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles, California from June 1986 through October 1988. The State Board for Dentistry recommends that his advanced education be considered as the substantial equivalent of the two-year program required in Regulation.

Statement of Problem: Regulations of the Commissioner require an applicant for licensure in dentistry to complete an acceptable preprofessional education program of at least two years in length (including courses in general chemistry, organic chemistry, biology or zoology, and physics) and an acceptable professional dental education program of at least four years in length, for a total of six years of preprofessional and professional education.

Dr. Salgado completed a five-year combined preprofessional and professional dental education program at National University of Colombia in Bogota, Colombia. Therefore, he lacks one year of education which is in the preprofessional area.

However, Dr. Salgado also completed a two-year Associate in Applied Science degree in Dental Hygiene from August 2008 to May 2010 at Hudson Valley Community College in Troy, New York. The State Board for Dentistry recommends that these studies be considered to fulfill the remaining one year of required preprofessional education.

Additionally, an applicant who completed a program of dental education in an unregistered or unaccredited dental school must complete the required two academic years of study in an accredited dental school program, culminating in certification that the applicant has achieved the level of knowledge and clinical proficiency expected of a graduate of that school. Dr. Salgado also completed two years of ADA-accredited advanced study in General Dentistry at Lutheran Medical Center Department of Dental Medicine in Brooklyn, New York from September 2011 to September 2013. The State Board for Dentistry recommends that his advanced education be considered as the substantial equivalent of the two-year program required in Regulation.

Petition for: Acceptance of education.

Statement of Problem: Regulations of the Commissioner require an applicant for licensure in dentistry to complete an acceptable preprofessional education program of at least two years in length (including courses in general chemistry, organic chemistry, biology or zoology, and physics) and an acceptable professional dental education program of at least four years in length, for a total of six years of preprofessional and professional education.

Dr. Xiao completed a five-year combined preprofessional and professional dental education program at Sichuan University in Chengdu, Sichuan, People's Republic of China. Therefore, she lacks one year of education which is in the preprofessional area.

However, Dr. Xiao also completed a two-year Master of Stomatology degree from September 2003 through June 2005 at Sichuan University in Chengdu, Sichuan, People's Republic of China. The State Board for Dentistry recommends that these studies be considered to fulfill the remaining one year of required preprofessional education.

Additionally, an applicant who completed a program of dental education in an unregistered or unaccredited dental school must complete the required two academic years of study in an accredited dental school program, culminating in certification that the applicant has achieved the level of knowledge and clinical proficiency expected of a graduate of that school. Dr. Xiao also completed two years of ADA-accredited advanced study in General Dentistry at University of Rochester Eastman Institute of Oral Health in Rochester, New York from December 2012 to February 2013. The State Board for Dentistry recommends that this advanced education be considered as the substantial equivalent of the two-year program required in Regulation.

## MEDICINE

Petition for: Waiver of the education requirement for licensure as a physician.

Statement of Problem: Education Law (E.L.) §6506(5) provides that in supervising the admission to and the practice of the professions, the Board of Regents may waive education, experience, and examination requirements for a professional license prescribed in the article relating to the profession, provided the Board of Regents shall be satisfied that the requirements of such article have been substantially met.

To implement the general requirements set in law, the Department has an established policy for waiver cases pursuant to §6506(5) that requires an applicant to document fulfillment of all of the following:

1. licensure in another US state or US territory following completion of the applicable professional education, experience, and examination requirements satisfactory to the jurisdiction in which licensed;
2. satisfactory evidence of professional practice including at least seven of the ten years preceding application for licensure in New York State; and
3. evidence of significant professional achievement.

Dr. Brian Lipari is applying for licensure as a physician. He meets the experience and examination requirements for licensure as outlined in E.L. §6524 with his three years of American Council on Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) accredited residency in Family Medicine and passing scores on all steps of the United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE).

The education requirement of E.L. §6524(2) reads as follows: “have received an education, including a degree of doctor of medicine, "M.D.", or doctor of osteopathy, "D.O.", or equivalent degree in accordance with the commissioner's regulations.” Section 60.1(a)(2) of the Commissioner’s Regulations further requires that an applicant for medical licensure must present evidence of “the completion of a curriculum of not less than 32 months in length in a medical program registered by the department, accredited by an accrediting organization acceptable to the department, or recognized by the appropriate civil authorities of the country in which the school is located as an acceptable educational program for physicians.”

Dr. Lipari completed a course of study at Saint Christopher’s College of Medicine and was awarded a Doctor of Medicine degree in March 2005. Saint Christopher’s College of Medicine is neither registered by the Department nor accredited by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) or the American Osteopathic Association (AOA). Therefore, to meet the requirements outlined in regulation it must be recognized in the country in which the school is located by the appropriate civil authorities.

Saint Christopher’s College of Medicine claims to be primarily located in Senegal and appropriately recognized by the Ministry of Higher Education of the Republic of Senegal since 2000. However, after thorough review of the history of the St. Christopher’s College of Medicine

program, we have concluded that St. Christopher's academic campus was located in Luton, England, United Kingdom (UK) at the time of Dr. Lipari's attendance.

In England, the General Medical Council (GMC) defines criteria for an acceptable medical qualification for the purposes of taking the licensing examination and obtaining registration with a license to practice in the UK. Therefore, the GMC is the "appropriate civil authority" to recognize whether or not the St. Christopher's College of Medicine program is acceptable in Dr. Lipari's case.

According to April 2008 correspondence with the GMC's Intelligence and International Liaison Manager, "The GMC no longer regards degrees issued by St. Christopher's College of Medicine as being acceptable for the purposes of obtaining registration. This decision was made in November 2005 and applies to all graduates of St. Christopher's, regardless of their graduation date."

Further correspondence in July 2013 confirms that this is still the case and that a St. Christopher's graduate has never been fully registered in the UK. As to recognition, "where medical schools in the UK are concerned [the GMC's] quality assurance and other responsibilities are confined to the particular institutions named on the list that the GMC keeps under section 4(1) of the Medical Act 1983. St. Christopher's in Luton is not on that list. Nor was it on the list of schools that existed in 2005, or at any time before or after that."

As a result of this lack of recognition, which clearly covers the time of Dr. Lipari's attendance, his medical program cannot be considered acceptable toward the education requirements for licensure. It should be further noted that, historically and on a consistent basis, the Department has not accepted the education of any graduate of St. Christopher's College of Medicine.

However, Dr. Lipari is requesting that the department consider his medical education at St. Christopher's College of Medicine as substantially equivalent based on the program's recognition by Senegal's Government and the fact that the GMC's recognition decision was made after he had already graduated. Alternatively, he requests that the education requirement be waived in light of his subsequent achievements with regard to the licensure examination, postgraduate training experience, and licensure in Florida and Connecticut, as well as the "injustice suffered" as a result of St. Christopher's current status in the UK.

It should be noted that the Department does not substitute meeting and/or exceeding the examination and experience requirements in lieu of substantially meeting the education requirements. New York State also does not have reciprocity of licensure with any other jurisdiction in any profession, but reviews each application against the specific requirements for the profession set in law and regulation.

Furthermore, in keeping with the Department's policy for waiver cases, Dr. Lipari does not have at least seven years of professional practice in the ten years preceding his application for licensure in New York State, nor has he provided evidence of significant professional achievement (such as academic affiliations, research activities, and/or professional contributions).

As far as the perceived injustice is concerned, the purpose of the licensing laws is to assure the protection of the public; such protection is clearly of critical importance in the profession of medicine. For internationally-educated physicians, the Department relies on the

determinations of the country where a medical school is primarily located, and the determination as to whether a medical school is appropriately recognized is based on all information available at the time of review by the Department, not just at the time of an applicant's graduation.

Based on the fact that Dr. Lipari does not substantially meet the education requirements for licensure as a physician and he does not meet all three requirements for the grant of a waiver, Department staff do not support Dr. Lipari's petition to waive the education requirement pursuant to E.L. §6506.

**RECOMMENDATION:** The Committee on the Professions, in concurrence with the Executive Secretary of the State Board for Medicine, recommends that the applicant's petition to waive the education requirement pursuant to E.L. §6506 be denied.

## MEDICINE

Petition for: Conferral of the degree Doctor of Medicine (M.D.) pursuant to Section 6529 of the Education Law.

Summary Statement: The petitioners listed below are all graduates of foreign medical schools who have been licensed in New York.

The applicable requirements of Section 3.57 of the Rules of the Board of Regents require completion of a medical education program in a foreign medical school satisfactory to the Department which does not grant the degree Doctor of Medicine (M.D.), and in which the philosophy and curriculum were equivalent, as determined by the Department in accordance with the policy of the Board of Regents, to those in programs leading to the degree Doctor of Medicine (M.D.) at medical schools in the United States satisfactory to, or registered by, the Board of Regents and the Department. Secondly, petitioners must have licensure to practice medicine in New York State in accordance with provisions of Section 6524 or 6528 of the Education Law or their equivalent as determined by the Board of Regents pursuant to their authority under Section 6506 of the Education Law.
