STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

HIGHER EDUCATION

The Higher Education Committee held its scheduled meeting on September 12, 2022. All members were present except Regent Kathleen M. Cashin, who was excused. Regent Ruth B. Turner also attended the meeting.

MATTERS NOT REQUIRING BOARD ACTION

Proposed Amendment of Sections 80-3.7 and 80-5.22 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to the Degree and Experience Requirements for College Professors for the Transitional G Certificate and Through the Individual Evaluation Pathway to Certification [HE (D) 1]

Department staff presented proposed amendments to the Commissioner's regulations to revise the requirements for the Transitional G certificate and certification through the individual evaluation pathway for college professors by no longer requiring them to complete their teaching experience within 10 years immediately preceding the certificate application date, and allowing them to meet the education requirement if they hold a baccalaureate degree in the area of a certificate title, or in a closely related subject area acceptable to the Department, and a graduate degree in another area.

Deputy Commissioner William Murphy reviewed the items on the Consent Agenda.

P-12 EDUCATION

The P-12 Education Committee held its scheduled meeting on September 12, 2022. All members were present except Regent Tilles, who was excused. Regent Collins, Regent Hakanson, Regent Reyes, and Regent Mittler also attended the meeting but did not vote on any action.

ACTION ITEMS

Proposed Amendment of Section 100.5(b) of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to the Laboratory Experience Required in Order to Take a Science Regents Examination [P-12 (A) 1 - REVISED]

Department staff presented for emergency adoption proposed amendments to the Commissioner's regulations to permit students to complete the required 1,200 minutes of laboratory experience through a combination of hands-on and simulated laboratory experience.

The Committee recommends that section 100.5(b) of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education be amended, as submitted, effective September 13, 2022, as an emergency action upon a finding by the Board of Regents that such action is necessary for the preservation of the general welfare to immediately permit students to satisfy the science laboratory experience requirements to take a science Regents Examination through both hands-on and simulated experience.

The motion passed unanimously.

Proposed Amendment of Section 151-1.3 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to Universal Prekindergarten Program (UPK) Staffing Qualifications [P-12 (A) 2]

Department staff presented for emergency adoption proposed amendments to the Commissioner's regulations relating to staffing qualifications for pre-kindergarten teachers.

The Committee recommends that section 151-1.3 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education be amended, as submitted, effective September 13, 2022, as an emergency rule upon a finding by the Board of Regents that such action is necessary for the preservation of the general welfare to immediately conform Commissioner's regulations with the amendments made to Education Law §3602-e by Part A of Chapter 56 of the laws of 2022, which took effect April 1, 2022.

The motion passed unanimously.

Proposed Amendment of Sections 200.7, 200.16, and 200.20 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to Remote Instruction and its Delivery Under Emergency Conditions and Length of School Day for Approved School-Age and Preschool Programs Serving Students with Disabilities [P-12 (A) 3]

Department staff presented for emergency adoption proposed amendments to the Commissioner's regulations relating to remote instruction and its delivery under emergency conditions for students in approved private schools for the education of students with disabilities, state-supported schools, state-operated schools, and approved preschool special education programs. These proposed regulations would provide the same flexibility for remote instruction under emergency conditions that was proposed for districts at the April 2022 Board of Regents meeting.

The Committee recommends that sections 200.7, 200.16, and 200.20 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education be amended, as submitted, effective September 13, 2022, as an emergency action upon a finding by the Board of Regents that such action is necessary for the preservation of the general welfare to permit approved special education providers to provide remote instruction in the 2022-2023 school year on days they would otherwise close due to an emergency and to count such instructional days towards

minimum requirements and to identify the ways in which such remote instruction may be delivered.

The motion passed unanimously.

Proposed Amendment of Sections 100.1, 155.17, and 175.5 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to Remote Instruction and its Delivery under Emergency Conditions [P-12 (A) 4]

Department staff presented for permanent adoption proposed amendments to the Commissioner's regulations relating to remote instruction and its delivery under emergency conditions.

The Committee recommends that sections 100.1, 155.17, and 175.5 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education be amended, as submitted, effective September 28, 2022.

The motion passed unanimously.

Proposed Amendment of Section 135.5 and Addition of Section 136.9 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to Implementing the Dominic Murray Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention Act [P-12 (A) 5]

Department staff presented revisions to the proposed amendments to the Commissioner's regulations relating to implementing the Dominic Murray Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention Act. This was presented for second Emergency Action.

The Committee recommends that section 135.5 of the Commissioner's regulations be amended, and section 136.9 of the Commissioner's regulations be added, as submitted, effective September 13, 2022, as an emergency action upon a finding by the Board of Regents that such action is necessary for the preservation of the general welfare and public health to timely implement the provisions of the Dominic Murray Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention Act (Chapter 500 of the Laws of 2021) on its effective date, and to ensure that the emergency action taken at the May Regents meeting remains continuously in effect.

The motion passed unanimously.

Proposed Amendment of Section 155.17 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to School Safety Plans [P-12 (A) 6]

Department staff presented for emergency adoption proposed amendments to the Commissioner's regulations to implement Alyssa's Law, which amends Education Law §2801-a to require schools to consider silent panic alarm systems when reviewing and amending district and school safety plans.

The Committee recommends that section 155.17 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education be amended, as submitted, effective September 13, 2022, as an emergency action upon a finding by the Board of Regents that such action is necessary for the preservation of the public health and general welfare to immediately conform section 155.17 of the Commissioner's regulations with the amendments made to Education Law §2801-a by Chapter 227 of the Laws of 2022, which became effective on June 23, 2022.

The motion passed unanimously.

Proposed Addition of Part 130 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to Substantially Equivalent Instruction for Nonpublic School Students [P-12 (A) 7]

Department staff presented for permanent adoption proposed amendments to the Commissioner's regulations to establish requirements pertaining to the determination that substantially equivalent instruction is provided in nonpublic schools.

The Committee recommends that Part 130 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education be added, as submitted, effective September 28, 2022.

The motion passed unanimously.

MOTION FOR ACTION BY FULL BOARD

The P-12 Education Committee recommends, and we move, that the Board of Regents act affirmatively upon each recommendation in the written report of the Committee's deliberations at its meeting on September 13, 2022, copies of which have been distributed to each Regent.

MATTERS NOT REQUIRING BOARD ACTION

Proposed Amendment of Sections 275.3, 275.9, 275.17, 276.4, and 276.8 Repeal of Section 276.2, and Addition of a New Section 276.2 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to Form of Pleadings, Electronic Filing, Extensions for Filing Memoranda of Law, Confidential Resolution Conferences, and Oral Arguments for Appeals to the Commissioner of Education under Education Law §310 [P-12 (D) 1]

Department staff presented proposed amendments to the Commissioner's regulations relating to the proper form of pleadings, permitting alternative service of a petition by mail and email with prior permission of the Commissioner, electronic filing of pleadings, extensions for filing memoranda of law, confidential resolution conferences, and oral arguments for Education Law §310 Appeals of the Commissioner of Education.

Update on Department Plans for Restarting the Accountability System Required Under the Every Student Succeeds Act

Department staff presented an overview of the work that has been conducted to meet federal requirements related to restarting the ESSA Accountability system that will be implemented in the 2022-2023 school year following two years of USDE provided waivers that allowed the Department to suspend accountability determinations due to COVID-19 disruptions.

Presentation of the Graduation Measures Blue Ribbon Commission Demographics

Department staff presented the demographics of the members of the Graduation Measures Blue Ribbon Commission.

Deputy Commissioner Angelique Johnson-Dingle reviewed the items on the Consent Agenda.

PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

The Professional Practice Committee held its scheduled meeting on September 12, 2022. All members were present. Chancellor Lester W. Young, Jr., Regent Luis O. Reyes, Regent Susan W. Mittler, Regent Aramina Vega Ferrer, Regent Shino Tanikawa, and Regent Roger P. Catania also attended the meeting, but did not vote on any action.

ACTION ITEMS

Professional Discipline Cases [PPC EXS (A) 1-3]

The Committee recommends that the reports of the Regents Review Committees, including rulings, findings of fact, determinations as to guilt, and recommendations, by unanimous or majority vote, contained in those reports which have been distributed to you, be accepted in 4 cases. In addition, your Committee recommends, upon the recommendation of the Committee on the Professions, that 45 consent order applications and 25 surrender applications be granted, with Regent Wade S. Norwood abstaining from 1 consent order case (Calendar No. 33041), Regent Catherine Collins dissenting in 4 consent order cases (Calendar Nos. 33026, 32625, 32626, and 32991), and Regent Ruth B. Turner dissenting in 4 consent order cases (Calendar Nos. 33026, 32625, 32626, and 33026, 32625, 32626, and 33119).

These recommendations are made following the review of 74 cases involving sixteen registered professional nurses, nine licensed practical nurses, seven certified public accountants, seven licensed practical nurses who are also registered professional nurses, four physical therapists, two architects, two pharmacists, two professional engineers, two veterinarians, one acupuncturist, one architecture professional corporation, one certified

public accountancy foreign limited liability partnership, one certified public accountancy professional service limited liability company, one chiropractor, one dentist, one licensed clinical social worker, one licensed master social worker, one licensed master social worker, one licensed master social worker, one pharmacy, one professional engineering professional corporation, one psychologist, and one registered professional nurse who is also a nurse practitioner (Family Health).

Restorations [PPC EXS (A) 4-5]

The Committee recommends the following:

That within six months from the effective date of this Order, Dr. Antoinette Lloyd shall, obtain at her own expense a mental health evaluation from a qualified mental health professional previously approved by the Director of the Physician Monitoring Program, Department of Health, Office of Professional Medical Conduct; which shall note that the applicant is mentally fit to practice her profession, and submit written proof to the Office of Professional Medical Conduct and to the Board of Regents of said evaluation. That upon receipt of said documents, the execution of the surrender of Dr. Antoinette Lloyd's license to practice as a Physician in the State of New York be stayed, and that she be placed on probation for a period of two years under the specified terms and conditions of probation and, upon successful completion of the probation, that her license to practice as a Physician in New York State be fully restored. [PPC EXS (A) 4]

That the application of Gangadhar Madupu for the restoration of his license to practice as a Physician in New York State be denied. [PPC EXS (A) 5]

Proposed Amendment of Section 29.14 of the Rules of the Board of Regents and Section 64.5 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to Regulation of Nurse Practitioner Practice [PPC (A) 1]

Department staff presented for emergency adoption proposed amendments to the Regents' Rules and the Commissioner's regulations to conform them to Part C of Chapter 57 of the Laws of 2022, which effective April 11, 2022, among other things, waives the requirement that certain nurse practitioners have a written practice agreement with a physician and makes the Nurse Practitioner Modernization Act permanent.

The Committee recommends that subdivision (a) of section 29.14 of the Rules of the Board of Regents and subdivision (a) of section 64.5 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education be amended, as submitted, effective September 13, 2022 as an emergency action upon a finding by the Board of Regents that such action is necessary for the preservation of the public health and general welfare to immediately conform regulatory provisions with Part C of Chapter 57 of the Laws of 2022, which became effective April 1, 2022.

Proposed Amendment of Section 64.7 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to the Execution by Registered Professional Nurses of Non-Patient Specific Orders to Administer COVID-19 Tests and Influenza Tests [PPC (A) 2]

Department staff presented for emergency adoption proposed amendments to the Commissioner's regulations to conform them to Part C of Chapter 57 of the Laws of 2022, which effective April 11, 2022, among other things, allows physicians and nurse practitioners to issue non-patient specific orders for tests for COVID-19 or its antibodies or influenza.

The Committee recommends that section 64.7 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education be amended, as submitted, effective September 13, 2022, as an emergency action upon a finding by the Board of Regents that such action is necessary for the preservation of the public health and general welfare to immediately implement Part C of Chapter 57 of the Laws of 2022, which became effective April 1, 2022.

III. RESTORATIONS

The Board of Regents voted on September 13, 2022 that within six months from the effective date of the Order, Dr. Antoinette Lloyd, Lehigh Acres, FL shall, obtain at her own expense a mental health evaluation from a qualified mental health professional, which shall note that she is mentally fit to practice her profession. Upon receipt of said evaluation, the execution of the surrender of Dr. Antoinette Lloyd's license to practice as a Physician in the State of New York be stayed, and that she be placed on probation for a period of two years under the specified terms and conditions of probation, and that upon completion of probation her application for restoration of her physician license be fully granted. Dr. Lloyd's license was surrendered March 15, 2012.

The Board of Regents voted on September 13, 2022 to deny the application for restoration of the physician license of Gangadhar Madupu, Rome, NY. Dr. Madupu's license was surrendered May 20, 2010.

COMPULSORY EDUCATION LAW



Education Law §3204(2) requires that instruction for students in nonpublic schools "shall be at least substantially equivalent to the instruction given to minors of like age and attainments at the public schools of the city or district where the minor resides."

LOCAL PUBLIC & NONPUBLIC SCHOOLS' RESPONSIBILITIES UNDER COMPULSORY EDUCATION LAW



Public School District:

Ensure resident students receive instruction to which they are entitled under the law.

Public School District:

Confirm that the education provided in nonpublic schools is substantially equivalent to that of local public schools.

Nonpublic School:

Demonstrate that instruction provided in their school is substantially equivalent.

- Registered high schools (and their same-organization grade 1-8 programs)
- Demonstrate grade-level progress on approved assessments


ADDRESSING POSSIBLE MISCONCEPTIONS

The regulation does:	
NOT Impose	a new obligation on LSAs to ensure substantial equivalency in nonpublic schools
NOT Require	all nonpublic schools to have an LSA review if they choose a pathway
NOT Single out	any one group or groups
NOT Mandate	specific curriculum or courses other than those required by statute
NOT Allow	anyone to file an appeal to the Commissioner. Only aggrieved parties may file such an appeal
NOT Regulate	religious instruction

Nonpublic schools may choose 1) a pathway or 2) to participate in a review by the local school district to demonstrate substantial equivalency (SE) of instruction

After Reviews Complete Additional Time for SE Determination

Local School Authority (LSA) identifies nonpublic schools in their boundaries. LSA receives notice LSA completes / evidence of initial reviews for pathway or selection existing schools & of LSA review within two years option. after a new school opens.

School board votes on SE determinations for nonpublic schools requiring LSA review. If a nonpublic school needs more time to demonstrate SE, it has a reasonable timeline for doing so the Commissioner can grant additional time.



Resolution in Recognition of the Service and Dedication of Dora Lee Stanley

Dora Lee Stanley will retire from her service at the Office of Adult Career and Continuing Education Services - Vocational Rehabilitation (ACCES-VR) at the end of September 2022.

In 1980, Dora Lee relocated from Brooklyn to Saratoga to start her career in state service as a Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor at the Office for People with Developmental Disabilities Wilton Development Center. In 1984, she became a Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor at the NYS Crime Victim Board. In 2001, Dora Lee joined the Office of Special Education at the New York State Education Department, where she worked on middle school policies and interagency initiatives related to school-based mental health clinics. This work led to Dora Lee joining ACCES-VR, which at the time was VESID.

While at ACCES-VR, Dora Lee has worked in various areas, including the training of ACCES-VR staff, recruitment and mentoring of Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor interns, coordination of annual vendor and consumer satisfaction surveys, coordination of data exchange agreements with the Department of Labor, and facilitation of the Marge Tierney Scholarship.

In addition to these duties, Dora Lee has represented ACCES-VR on numerous advisory groups, including the Development Disability Planning Council, New York State Justice Center, and various Graduate School Programs in Vocational Rehabilitation. Dora Lee has also been instrumental in the development and implementation of the Advisory Council on Postsecondary Education for Students with Disabilities.

Dora Lee's greatest career legacy will be in her role as a mentor to each of ACCES-VR's 25 District Offices and Central Office staff. She has assisted staff in applying to graduate school vocational rehabilitation programs, applying for internships, and applying for employment at NYSED. Under Dora Lee's leadership, 425 interns have been mentored, 98 interns were hired as ACCES-VR Vocational Rehabilitation Counselors, and 17 graduate students have received the Marge Tierney Scholarship. This is a wonderful legacy to be proud of.

Dora Lee, you are truly one of a kind. With your meticulous attention to detail, gentle yet persistent style of follow up, positive energy, and encouraging demeanor, you have served the people of New York and the New York State Education Department with class, style and distinction. We thank you for your commitment to lifelong learning and growth and wish you joy, good health, lots of travel, and quality time with your loved ones as you enter this next chapter. It has been an honor having you as a member of the NYSED family.


