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SUMMARY

Issues for Discussion

The Regents advance State budget and legislative priorities every year. At the October meeting, the Regents Subcommittee on State Aid reviewed and discussed proposals advanced during the 2017 budget cycle and legislative session. At the November meeting, the relevant committees of the Board will review and discuss these proposals, as well as review and discuss new initiatives. Proposal	Policy Area	History/Notes
Enhanced Discipline Authority of the Licensed Professions - Add moral character requirements to the professions that currently do not have them, require that licensees notify the Department of a crime or pending conviction of a crime rather than when applying for registration/re-registration every 2-3 years, create a summary suspension of a license when there are serious public health and safety issues.	Efficiency	Legislation passed the Senate again for the second year in a row, but was not introduced in the Assembly (S.1380a LaValle).
