#### **STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS**

#### CULTURAL EDUCATION

Your Committee on Cultural Education had its scheduled meeting on December 11, 2018. Regent Roger Tilles, Co-Chair of the Cultural Education Committee, submitted the following written report. In attendance were committee members: Regent Tilles, Co-Chair, Regent Cea, Regent Cottrell, Regent Ouderkirk and Regent Mead. Regents, in addition to Cultural Education Committee Members, in attendance were: Chancellor Rosa, Vice Chancellor Brown, Regent Cashin, Regent Norwood, Regent Hakanson, Regent Reyes, and Regent Mittler.

Also in attendance were Commissioner Elia, Executive Deputy Commissioner Berlin, Senior Deputy Commissioner for Educational Policy Jhone Ebert, and Counsel and Deputy Commissioner for Legal Affairs Alison Bianchi.

#### ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

Co-Chair Regent Tilles welcomed everyone. Regent Tilles then introduced Deputy Commissioner Mark Schaming. Deputy Commissioner Schaming provided a brief report on Office of Cultural Education news and activities:

- At the New York Library Association annual conference last month, Bernard Margolis was posthumously awarded the 2018 NYLA Senator Hugh Farley Outstanding Advocate Award. This award is given to an individual who has made a far reaching, sustained contribution to the promotion and support of library and information services to the people of New York State.
- In addition, the New York Library Association awarded Carol Desch, Coordinator of Statewide Library Services and Director of Library Development, the 2018 NYLA Above and Beyond Award. This award honors individuals who have made significant contributions of recognized service to NYLA and the library profession.

- The New York State Archives exhibited the original New York State constitution on November 15 in Kingston in commemoration of the 200th anniversary of Ulster County's courthouse. Approximately 500 people saw the document, including 300 students.
- On December 2, the State Museum hosted the 5th Annual Taste NY Holiday Market. Over 6,000 visitors shopped at 30 "made in New York" food and beverage vendors, attended cooking demonstrations, and learned what food New Yorkers ate in the 18th century.

#### **Regents Advisory Council on Museum Appointments** [CE (A) 1]

Department staff will present proposed appointments to the Regents Advisory Council on Museums for Board of Regents approval. Members of the Regents Advisory Council on Museums offer advice and consultation on issues of policy and service pursuant to the Board's statutory mandate to operate the State Museum and oversee museums across New York State. The recommended appointments to the Museum Regents Advisory Council are: David Kahn, Executive Director of the Adirondack Experience The Museum on Blue Mountain Lake and Barbara Hunt McLanahan, Executive Director of the Children's Museum of the Arts, both for five-year terms through December 31, 2023.

## State Museum Overview of Native American Graves and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) [CE(D) 1]

NAGPRA is a federal law passed in 1990 to provide a process for the return of cultural items to federally recognized Native American tribes. Consultation with Native American groups has resulted in numerous successful repatriations and collaborations, including new additions to the State Museum's collections. Lisa Anderson, NAGPRA Coordinator, and Gwen Saul, Curator of Ethnology, discussed the NAGPRA process, recent repatriations and acquisitions.

Your P-12 Education Committee held its scheduled meeting on December 10, 2018. All members were present.

#### **ACTION ITEMS**

#### Initial Application Authorized by the Board of Regents [P-12 (A) 1]

Your Committee recommends that the Regents find that: (1) the proposed charter school meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of Article 56 of the Education Law; and (4) granting the application will have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves and issues a charter and provisional charter to the Hellenic Classical Charter School – Staten Island for a term of five years in accordance with §2851(2)(p) of the Education Law. The motion passed. Regents Collins and Mittler were in opposition.

## Implementation of the State's Approved Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Plan [P-12 (A) 2]

Your Committee recommends that sections 100.2(ff), 100.2(m), 100.18, 100.19 and Part 120 of the Commissioner's Regulations as amended and §100.21 as added to the Commissioner's Regulations as an emergency measure at the November 2018 Board of Regents meeting be repealed, effective December 18, 2018.

Your Committee further recommends that sections 100.2(ff), 100.2(m), 100.18, 100.19 and Part 120 of the Commissioner's Regulations be amended and that §100.21 be added to the Commissioner's Regulations, as submitted, effective December 18, 2018, as an emergency action upon a finding by the Board of Regents that such action is necessary for the preservation of general welfare to ensure that the State's USDE approved ESSA plan can be implemented beginning with the 2018-2019 school year, consistent with the

requirements set forth by the USDE and to ensure that the emergency rule adopted at the June Regents meeting, and subsequently revised at the September and November Regents meetings, can remain continuously in effect until adopted as a permanent rule. The motion passed unanimously.

#### MATTERS NOT REQUIRING BOARD ACTION

**New York State My Brother's Keeper Initiative** [P-12 (D) 1] – the Committee was provided with an update on the various components of the My Brother's Keeper (MBK) Initiative in the areas of the Challenge Grant, Teacher Opportunity Corps, Family and Community Engagement Grants, MBK Fellows Grant, Native American Program Grant, Exemplary Schools and Model Practices Grant, and the latest initiative from the My Brother's Keeper Alliance that involves the Department.

**Pathways to a New York State Diploma** – the Committee was provided with an historical context of the graduation requirements for a New York Tate Diploma. The presentation included the current 4 + 1 options, status of the work occurring around a capstone project and the role seals can play in moving toward one New York State diploma. A timeline of milestones for convening a Blue Ribbon Commission was also presented.

#### P-12 EDUCATION/ADULT CAREER AND CONTINUING EDUCATION SERVICES

Your P-12 Education and Adult Career and Continuing Education Services Committees held their scheduled meeting on December 10, 2018. All members were present.

#### MATTERS NOT REQUIRING BOARD ACTION

**Improving Services and Outcomes for Students and Young Adults with Disabilities** [P-12/ACCES (D) 1] – the Committee was provided with information on the Department's collaborative work to identify and implement effective practices and professional development to improve outcomes for students and young adults with disabilities (differently abled). Department staff discussed the 16 key State Performance Plan indicators and amendments to the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) which included the addition of pre-employment transition services (Pre-ETS) for students who are differently abled. Pre-ETS includes job exploration counseling, work-based learning experiences, counseling on postsecondary options, workplace readiness training, and instruction in self-advocacy. The Department will continue to collaborate to identify and implement effective practices and provide professional development necessary to improve services and outcomes for children and young adults who are differently abled.

#### P-12 EDUCATION/HIGHER EDUCATION

Your P-12 Education and Higher Education Committees held their scheduled meeting on December 10, 2018. All members were present.

#### MATTERS NOT REQUIRING BOARD ACTION

**Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) Task Force Recommendations** [P-12/HE (D) 1] – the Committee was provided with an overview of the Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) Task Force recommendations and general themes for the DASA training requirement for certification and other related recommended changes to educator preparation programs. The DASA Task Force was reconvened in 2017 in response to concerns regarding the effectiveness of the DASA training. The reconvened Task Force was charged with examining the content of the DASA training and various means to ensure that prospective school professionals receive effective training before they assume their respective responsibilities. Discussion focused on recommendations and themes that emerged from the reconvened Task Force discussions, specifically the recommendation requiring a three-semester hour multicultural education course that addresses and assesses candidates' knowledge and abilities related to the means for the prevention of and intervention in harassment, bullying, and discrimination. The Department will work with educator preparation providers to incorporate other essential preparation topics into the multicultural education course or across the current program.

#### PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

Your Professional Practice Committee held its scheduled meeting on December 11, 2018. All members were present, Chancellor Betty A. Rosa, Kathleen M. Cashin and Regent Roger Tilles were also present but did not vote on any case or action.

#### ACTION ITEMS

**Professional Discipline Cases** 

Your Committee recommends that the reports of the Regents Review Committees, including rulings, findings of fact, determinations as to guilt, and recommendations, by unanimous or majority vote, contained in those reports which have been distributed to you, be accepted in 4 cases. In addition, your Committee recommends, upon the recommendation of the Committee on the Professions, that 28 consent order applications and 4 surrender applications be granted, and further recommends that 2 summary suspension applications be granted, with Regent Josephine Victoria Finn abstaining in such summary suspension cases.

In the case of Rebecca E. Hilton a/k/a Rebecca E. Owens, Licensed Practical Nurse, Calendar No. 29137, we recommend that the spelling of the title of respondent's profession shown in the Regents Review Committee report be deemed corrected throughout such report and be deemed in all instances to read "Licensed Practical Nurse".

In the case of Jennifer Ann Muehlig, Licensed Practical Nurse, Calendar No. 29456, we recommend that (1) the third recommendation of the Regents Review Committee shown on page numbered four of its report be deemed corrected to show that such recommendation relates to the penalty to be imposed upon respondent and, as so amended, to read "That the recommendation as to the penalty to be imposed rendered by the hearing panel be accepted; and"; and (2) that the entire sentence beginning with the word "Additionally" on the last line of page numbered three of the Regents Review Committee report and continuing onto the top of page numbered four of such report and ending with the word "discretion" be deemed deleted.

In the case of Mercedes Francesca Wagstaff, Licensed Practical Nurse & Registered Professional Nurse, Calendar Nos. 30334 & 30335, we recommend that the abstention of Regent Catherine Collins in the determination of the Board of Regents in these matters be noted and that an Amended Vote & Order be issued to reflect the November 6, 2018 determination of the Board of Regents in these matters, including the abstention by Regent Collins at such time, said November 6, 2018 determination of the Board of Regents in these matters shall remain and continue in effect.

These recommendations are made following the review of 38 cases involving fifteen licensed practical nurses, six registered professional nurses, three certified public accountants, two architects, two licensed practical nurses who are also registered professional nurses, two massage therapists, one dental hygienist, one landscape architect, one licensed clinical social worker, one pharmacist, one pharmacy, and one public accountancy partnership.

Dear Chancellor Rosa,

I commend your continued efforts to strengthen and expand pre-kindergarten education, and I am writing to urge your assistance in addressing two pertinent issues as you finalize your 2019 budget priorities including: **the current lack of state Pre-K transportation aid, and the need for a policy study regarding a revised start date for children to begin kindergarten.** Both of these would support early learning that is so essential for student success.

#### Aid for Pre-K Transportation

Transportation is essential for many children to be able to attend school and the lack of state transportation aid for Pre-K students makes it difficult for many upstate districts to offer Pre-K transportation, thereby limiting access for needy families to existing Pre-K programs. Because of the lack of state subsidies, most districts that do offer Pre-K programs cannot afford to transport Pre-K students without these subsidies, often leaving parents who do not have transportation alternatives to forego this critical educational opportunity for their children. It is often these same families whose children would most benefit from Pre-K education preventing more costly remedial assistance in future years.

In the Assembly, I carry a bill (A.1762-B) in the Assembly, to provide parity to Pre-K transportation in a manner similar to the K - 12 transportation, and it has garnered considerable support with 41 cosponsors. I have also shared and discussed this proposal with SED staff. Your support in recommending funding in this year's budget priorities would go a long way in elevating this issue and need.

#### Age of Start Date for Kindergarten

There is a growing body of research noting children who are four (these with fall birthdays) when they begin kindergarten are often too young developmentally and struggle academically as a result. The negative impact of having a poor start to their education may be long lasting and can affect their future academic progress. There are varying views on this pointing to a need for a comprehensive review of the issue. I will be introducing legislation in the upcoming legislative session that requests the Regents study the readiness of children who become five after September 1<sup>st</sup> in any school year, review best practices in early education, and issue recommendations.

Please note, since I personally support an age change, I have previously sponsored a bill (A.1763) to amend the education law by phasing in over a three year period the required age to begin attending school. As you are aware, in New York State, children are not required by law to attend school until age six (a related concern) and currently must turn six before December 1st. Modeled after recent changes in California, this bill changes the start date month gradually, over a period of three years, to September 1st to ensure that children are slightly older and more mature before starting school enabling an easier and more successful transition to school.

I recognized that early childhood education has been an important part of the Regents agenda, and I urge your consideration in adding both funding for Pre-K transportation and a policy study of best practices for kindergarten age start dates. I am more than happy to discuss these issues with you and your colleagues and will continue to advocate for these needs in the legislature.

Thank you in advance for your consideration and for all you do on behalf on the children of New York State.

#### **Issue for Decision**

Should the Board of Regents approve the 2019-2020 State Aid proposal reflecting the Regents' priorities for State Aid to school districts?

#### Reason(s) for Consideration

Policy Implementation.

#### Proposed Handling

This detailed State Aid Proposal will be presented to the Full Board for approval at the December 2018 meeting of the Board of Regents.

#### Procedural History

Each year the Board of Regents, through its State Aid Subcommittee, develops a proposal on State Aid to support public education. In developing the proposal for the 2019-2020 school year, the State Aid Subcommittee has considered an approach that focuses on the most important investments that need to be made in primary and secondary education, consistent with the "5 E's" of Regents priorities:

- 1. Equity
- 2. Every Student Succeeds Act Implementation
- 3. Early Childhood Learning
- 4. English Language Learners
- 5. Efficiency

In September, October, and November, members of the State Aid Subcommittee discussed their priority areas as well as concerns that have been raised by stakeholder groups, specifically including recommendations to continue the phase-in of the Foundation Aid formula and updating necessary components. Subcommittee members reviewed the recommended investment areas from proposals in previous years; discussed feedback and input gathered from stakeholders, educators, parents and business representatives; and considered how such past proposals aligned with the recognized priorities for the coming year.

Specifically, committee members highlighted the importance of:

- The continued phase-in of the Foundation Aid formula.
- The continued expansion of prekindergarten programs, aligned with the recommendations of the Early Childhood Blue Ribbon Committee.
- Enhancing support for English Language Learners.
- Expanding college and career pathways, focused through career and technical education.

The State Aid Subcommittee has constructed a proposal that meets these needs. The detailed State Aid proposal comes before the Subcommittee at its December meeting, and the Subcommittee will make a recommendation to the Full Board to approve.

#### **Background Information**

A decade after the end of the Great Recession, State Aid for school districts in recent years has rebounded to its highest statewide levels ever. At the same time, school districts continue to face fiscal challenges in the form of growing populations of students with needs. Despite over \$5 billion in increases since its inception in 2007, the Foundation Aid formula has not yet been fully phased in.

The Regents State Aid Proposal provides much-needed resources for school districts to maintain their base operations and educational programs while allowing for expansions in specified priority areas. The table below provides a summary level overview of these investments:

#### Foundation Aid (\$1.66 billion)

Foundation Aid, enacted by the Legislature and Governor in 2007 at the recommendation of the Board of Regents, provides general operating support for school districts. Proportionally greater funding flows to low wealth school districts and districts with a concentration of students who need it the most—those with special education needs, English Language Learners and economically disadvantaged students. As of the November 2018 School Aid Database, Foundation Aid provides \$17.1 billion in funding to districts statewide, with \$4.1 billion in remaining phase-in increases, not counting inflationary adjustments.

In order to provide stability and predictability to the Foundation Aid formula, the Regents State Aid Proposal calls for the restoration of an inflationary adjustment (called the "phase-in foundation percent") over a three-year period, and the full phase-in the formula by the 2021-22 school year. This additional adjustment would increase the full phase-in amount to \$4.9 billion, but it would eliminate the dramatic fluctuations in the phase-in calculation since the expiration of the inflationary adjustment. This change, coupled with a fixed three-year phase-in schedule, would provide over \$1.6 billion in additional annual Foundation Aid statewide over the next three years, achieved through a combination of three targeted increases:

- A uniform percentage phase-in increase for all districts that have a remaining phase-in.
- A minimum increase for all districts.
- A new \$85 million English Language Learner setaside within Foundation Aid, to accelerate additional Foundation Aid to districts through an ELL-driven formula, and will ensure that such funds are spent consistent with meeting Part 154 of the Commissioner's regulations (similar to the existing Community Schools setaside). If enacted, the Department would publish guidance for how school districts would be required to spend these additional funds.

#### Statutory Reimbursement-based Aids (\$410 million)

Consistent with existing law and the most recent claims submitted by school districts to the Department, the Regents State Aid Proposal also includes \$410 million in increases for reimbursement-based aid formulas for the 2019-2020 school year, such as Building Aid (\$272 million), Transportation Aid (\$77 million), BOCES Aid (\$22 million), Public and Private Excess

Cost Aid for special education services (\$13 million), and the consolidation of prekindergarten programs (\$25 million).

Based on the recommendation of the Board of Regents, in 2017 the Governor and Legislature put the state on a path toward the consolidation of the multiple separate prekindergarten programs that existed. As a part of that consolidation, in the 2019-2020 school year there will be \$25 million in a federal prekindergarten grant that will become state-funded in order to allow those programs to continue to operate after the federal grants have expired. This \$25 million, though not additional funds for those school districts, is new state funding and thus is included within the \$410 million increase in reimbursement-based aids.

#### Career and Technical Education (\$25 million)

Recent years have shown reduced participation in career and technical education (CTE) programming, even as the Board was working to incorporate success in the most rigorous programs into the State's graduation pathways. In just six years, New York State will face a deficit of 350,000 workers for mid-level skill jobs which require more than a high school diploma but less than a four-year degree. High quality CTE programs are a boon to the state's economy – as they prepare the workforce of the future with the skills employees need on the first day of work.

The Regent's State Aid Proposal provides for additional CTE funding in two ways:

• Enhanced BOCES Aid for CTE Pathways Programs. The instructional salary eligible for BOCES Aid has remained fixed at \$30,000 per year since 1992. Since this flat reimbursement amount has not kept pace with the actual costs to employ well-prepared teachers to run strong programs, the state has effectively reduced its direct support for these programs over time. This may have reduced the ability of school districts to send students to high quality CTE programs offered by the BOCES, especially in an era of capped local revenues that make support for the costs of student participation extremely challenging. To address this issue and reap the benefits of high quality CTE programming for both students and the State's economy, the Regents recommend doubling the instructional salary ceiling to \$60,000 over the next five years, with 20 percent of the gap funded for services provided in 2018-2019, and 20 percent annually for four years thereafter, with any further adjustment necessary to bring the reimbursement salary into alignment with the effects of inflation occurring in the following year. After that, the reimbursement salary level should be indexed to the rates of growth in professionals' salaries (available in federal data) to avoid the reemergence of similar distortions in the future.

Enhanced and Expanded Aid for High Quality CTE programs Operated by the Big Five Cities and Non-component School Districts. The Board recommends that the state change its method of reimbursing the expenses for Career and Technical Education programming for the large cities and other non-BOCES component districts. The current program pays a flat per-pupil amount which has not been adjusted for inflation in some time. This has made it difficult for the non-BOCES component districts to maintain quality programs. To reflect the changes in the cost of operating career and technical education programs that provide the rigorous preparation necessary for success in the world of work, the Regents State Aid Proposal recommends that the reimbursement model for these districts be made more similar to that used for BOCES-operated programs.

As a transition, however, the Proposal would recommend a \$25 million increase in Special Services Aid as "seed money" so that non-BOCES component districts can begin to expand their programs in the 2019-2020 school year, while they wait for reimbursement in the 2020-2021 school year.

#### **Universal Prekindergarten (\$26 million)**

The Board has convened an Early Childhood Blue Ribbon Committee that has developed a robust series of recommendations to improve the quality and expand the opportunity of all early learning programs. In addition to the \$25 million in sustainable state funding to continue federal grant prekindergarten seats, the Regents State Aid Proposal would include a total of \$26 million for further expansion of programs for four-year-olds. First, \$20 million would allow for the addition of 2,000 more children to be served, which would bring the overall percentage of students served in New York State to just under 70%. Second, \$6 million would be provided for pilot programs which will target half- and full-day 10-month and summer inclusion prekindergarten programs for three- and four-year olds.

#### **Recommendation**

It is recommended that the Board take the following action:

VOTED that the Regents adopt the attached as their proposal on State Aid to school districts for the school year 2019-2020.

#### **Timetable for Implementation**

The Regents State Aid Proposal is effective immediately. The Regents State Aid Proposal is a recommendation to the Governor and the Legislature.
