SUMMARY

Issue for Decision

Should the Regents approve the proposed charter revision for Brooklyn Ascend Charter School (BACS), which is authorized by the Chancellor of the New York City Department of Education (NYCDOE)?

Reason(s) for Consideration

Required by State Statute.

Proposed Handling

This issue will come before the P-12 Education Committee and the Full Board for action at the February 2015 meeting of the Board of Regents.

Background Information

Brooklyn Ascend Charter School (or "the School") was first authorized by the Chancellor of the NYCDOE as a charter school to open for the 2008-2009 school year. The School is in its second charter term and was issued a full renewal in March 2013. The School is authorized to serve 1,365 students in Grades K-11 at the end of its charter term, June 30, 2018. The School currently enrolls 979 students in grades K-8 and is projected to reach full scale in 2018-2019, contingent on renewal.

The Chancellor of the NYCDOE recommends the following actions:

- increase the maximum authorized charter enrollment, and
- change its curricular model.

The chart below outlines the material terms of the Brooklyn Ascend Charter School's charter and the proposed revision.

Recommendation

VOTED: That the Board of Regents finds that the proposed revised charter: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) will permit the charter school to operate in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of Article 56 of the Education Law; and (4) will have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the above listed charter revision as proposed by Chancellor of the NYCDOE and the provisional charter for the Brooklyn Ascend Charter School is amended accordingly.

Timetable for Implementation

The Regents action for BACS authorized enrollment change would take effect beginning on July 1, 2015. The Regents action for BACS curricular model change would take effect upon approval by the Board of Regents.

Revision Background

• Brooklyn Ascend Charter School received a full renewal in March 2013. At the time of renewal, the School demonstrated academic achievement and progress.

- The only year for which the NYCDOE issued a Progress Report2 during the school's current charter term, 2012-2013, the School earned an overall grade of D and was in the bottom percentile of all K-8 public schools in New York City. However, the school's percent of students proficient in both ELA and math exceeded that of both Community School Districts (CSDs) of location, 17 and 18.
- The school improved the percent of students' proficient in both ELA and math from the 2012-2013 school year to the 2013-2014 school year. In ELA the percent proficient increased from 22% to 29%, and in math the percent proficient increased from 23% to 26%.
- The increase in students proficient in ELA resulted in an ELA median adjusted growth percentile of 64%, placing them in the 70th percentile of the peer schools.
- The increase in students proficient in math resulted in a math median adjusted growth percentile of 51%, placing them in the 20th percentile of the peer schools.
- According to the 2013-2014 NYC School Survey Report, 97% of parents who
 responded to the survey strongly agree or agree "that the school had high
 expectations for [their] child."3
- The revised enrollment proposal would permit the school to enroll 71 additional students for the current school year, and steadily decline that increase over the balance of the charter term, such that in the 2017-2018 school year, the total enrollment would be only 16 students more than the planned sum in the current charter. The proposed enrollment structure has been designed to increase each lower grade section by no more than three students, resulting in classroom sizes of 29 students on average.
- Since the school continues to phase in an additional grade per year, until it reaches its full grade span of K-12, the following describes how the school seeks to increase its enrollment:
 - 71 additional students (7.3%) over its current charter authorized enrollment in the 2014-2015 school year, from 975 students to 1046 students;
 - 52 additional students (4.7%) over its current charter authorized enrollment in the 2015-2016 school year, from 1105 students to 1157 students:
 - 34 additional students (2.8%) over its current charter authorized enrollment for the 2016-2017 school year, from 1235 students to 1269 students, and;

³ According to the 2013-2014 NYC School Survey, 70% of parent respondents strongly agree that Brooklyn Ascend Charter School has teachers who have high expectations for their child; another 27% agree with the statement.

- 16 additional students (1.1%) over its current charter authorized enrollment for the 2017-2018 school year, from 1365 students to 1381 students.
- After the spring 2014 lottery, the school had 2,347 students on the waitlist, which demonstrates demand for the school.
- The school is located in private facilities that can accommodate the additional students.
- As part of this material revision, the School also seeks to change its curricular model.
 - The school seeks to adopt new instructional methods that better prepare the students to meet both the expectations of the Common Core Learning Standards and college readiness, moreso than the school's original curricular model.
 - The school's CMO, Ascend Learning (Ascend), licensed from SABIS all curricula used in the Ascend schools. After the shift to the Common Core Learning Standards, Ascend found that it was necessary to supplement the SABIS curriculum with Ascend-developed curricular materials. Ascend was not satisfied with the schools' historical results on the new Common Core-aligned assessments, and concluded that the SABIS program was not aligned to the expectations of the Common Core in the manner desired by the schools and Ascend. Therefore Ascend decided to no longer continue the agreement with SABIS, and to assume the responsibility of identifying or developing all curricula used in the schools.
 - The curriculum will be known as "Version 2" and fully replace the SABIS curriculum. Version 2 curriculum will include the following academic components:
 - For ELA: Fundations (Elementary School [ES] level), Voyages in English: Grammar and Writing (ES level), Ascend-created Literature Circle (ES level), Social Studies/shared text (ES level, Middle School [MS] level), Guided Reading (ES level), Ascendcreated Humanities Program (grade 5)
 - For math: Singapore Math (ES level), Math Stories (ES level), Math Facts (ES level), TERC's Investigations in Number, Data, Space (ES level), Connected Mathematics Project 3 (MS level)
 - For science: A Closer Look (ES level), Science Education for Public Understanding Program (MS level)
 - For Spanish: Sube (grades K-1), Descubre (grades 2-5), ¡Avancemos! (grades 6-8)
 - For ESL: On Our Way to English
