### Permission to Operate: Centre College BR (CA) 1

**MOVED**, that the Board of Regents take the following action: section 79-13.5 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education be amended, as submitted, effective March 9, 2020, as an emergency action upon a finding by the Board of Regents that such action is necessary for the preservation of the public health and general welfare to immediately conform the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education to the requirements of Chapter 227 of the Laws of 2019, which establishes a new restricted license for clinical laboratory technologists in toxicology as long as certain requirements are met and allows individuals employed by a New York State Department of Health certified laboratory who meet the requirements for a restricted license to receive a certification allowing them to perform toxicology laboratory services and to ensure that the emergency adoption taken at the December meeting remains in effect until the proposed rule can be permanently adopted.

### STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

### CULTURAL EDUCATION

Your Committee on Cultural Education had its scheduled meeting on March 3, 2020. Regent Roger Tilles, Chair of the Cultural Education Committee, submitted the following written report. In attendance were committee members: Regent Tilles, Chair, Regent Cea, Regent Cottrell, Regent Ouderkirk and Regent Mead.

Regents, in addition to Cultural Education Committee members, in attendance were: Chancellor Rosa, Regent Collins, Regent Norwood, Regent Hakanson, Regent Reyes, and Regent Mittler. Also, in attendance was Interim Education Commissioner Shannon Tahoe and Acting Counsel Aaron Baldwin.

### ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

Chair Regent Tilles welcomed everyone. Deputy Commissioner Mark Schaming shared the following Office of Cultural Education updates:

Last month OCE hosted a variety of programs commemorating Black History Month including the Preliminary Emancipation Proclamation exhibition, a short play examining the experiences of enslaved individuals in Albany, NY in the late 18th century, and a reenactment presentation into the life story of Sojourner Truth.

OCE will host the annual Capital Region History Day on Saturday, March 21. Students in grades 6-12, working individually or in groups, showcase their history research projects through exhibits, documentaries, research papers, websites, and theatrical performances.

Last month the State Museum opened a new art exhibition: Tonalism: Pathway from the Hudson River School to Modern Art.

Amendment of Section 185.5 and Addition of Section 185.15 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to Local Government Record Retention Schedules (Discussion) [CE (D) 3]

State Archivist Tom Ruller present proposed amendments to section 185.5 and the addition of section 185.15 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education to issue a new records retention and disposition schedule for use by cities, towns, villages, fire districts, counties, school districts, boards of cooperative educational services, teacher resource and computer training centers, county vocational education and extension boards, and other local governments (Schedule LGS-1).

## **Confluence of Cultures: Educating the Public on Colonial New York** (Discussion) [CE (D) 2]

Deputy Commissioner Schaming discussed how OCE collections are used to educate the public on 17th century colonial New York and shared plans for a future State Museum gallery that examines this important formative chapter in New York's history and how it relates to the state we live in today.

## K-12 Educational Guide to Understanding Fort Orange and the Colonial Dutch (Discussion) [CE (D) 1]

Jordan Maul, Archives Partnership Trust, and Kelyn Snyder, 7th Grade Social Studies Teacher, discussed an educational guide created for teachers to help them introduce students to 17th century New York history and the impact of the colonial Dutch on the State's development.

### MOTION FOR ACTION BY FULL BOARD

Madam Chancellor and Colleagues: Your Higher Education Committee recommends, and we move, that the Board of Regents act affirmatively upon each recommendation in the written report of the Committee's deliberations at its meeting on March 3, 2020, copies of which have been distributed to each member of the Board of Regents.

### Matters Not Requiring Board Action:

Proposed Amendments to Sections 145-6.2, 145-6.5, and 145-6.6 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to the Eligibility Requirements for Loan Forgiveness and Grant Programs

Your Committee discussed proposed amendments to certain sections of Part 145 of the Commissioner's regulations to clarify the eligibility language to ensure that students made eligible under the DREAM Act may apply for applicable grant and loan forgiveness programs. In addition to amending section 145-6.2, the Regents Physician Loan Forgiveness Program, the proposed amendments seek to conform the student eligibility requirements to the DREAM Act for both the STEP and CSTEP programs, Sect. 145-6.5, and 145-6.6, respectively. Following the 60-day public comment period required under the State Administrative Procedure Act, it is anticipated that the proposed amendments will be presented to the Board of Regents for adoption at its July 2020 meeting. If adopted at the July 2020 meeting, the proposed amendments will become effective on July 29, 2020.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents find that the Bronx Charter School for the Arts: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the Bronx Charter School for the Arts and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2024.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents find that the Charter High School for Law and Social Justice: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the Charter High School for Law and Social Justice and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2023.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents find that New American Academy Charter School (The): (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of New American Academy Charter School (The) and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2023.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents find that the New Ventures Charter School: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the New Ventures Charter School and that a renewal

charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2025.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents find that the New Visions Charter High School for Advanced Math and Science IV: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the New Visions Charter High School for Advanced Math and Science IV and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2025.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents find that the New Visions Charter High School for the Humanities II: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the New Visions Charter High School for the Humanities II and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2023.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents find that the Rosalyn Yalow Charter School: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the Rosalyn Yalow Charter School and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2024.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents find that the Southside Academy Charter School: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the Southside Academy Charter School and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2023.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents find that the Western New York Maritime Charter School: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the Western New York Maritime Charter School and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2025.

The motion passed. Regents Collins and Mittler were opposed, Regent Reyes abstained.

### Renewals to Charters Authorized by the Trustees of the State University of New York [P-12 (A) 2]

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents return the proposed charters for Success Academy Charter School – Bed Stuy 2, Success Academy Charter School – Bushwick, Success Academy Charter School – Cobble Hill, Success Academy Charter School – Far Rockaway, Success Academy Charter School – Flatbush, Success Academy Charter School – South Jamaica, and Success Academy Charter School – Williamsburg to the Trustees of the State University of New York for reconsideration, with the following comment and recommendation: Approving the renewal of any charter school years before the expiration of the charter does not allow timely review of the school's educational and fiscal soundness, community support, legal compliance, or means by which the school will meet or exceed enrollment and retention targets for students with disabilities, English language learners, and students who are eligible applicants for the free and reduced price lunch program. The charters should be abandoned, and the schools should be directed to resubmit the application no earlier than one year prior to the expiration of the charter term.

The motion passed unanimously.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents finds that, the Cultural Arts Academy Charter School at Spring Creek: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the

applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the Cultural Arts Academy Charter School at Spring Creek and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2023.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents finds that, the Community Roots Charter School: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the Community Roots Charter School and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2025.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents finds that, the Equality Charter School: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the Equality Charter School and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2025.

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents finds that, the New Heights Academy Charter School: (1) meets the requirements set out in Article 56 of the Education Law, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations; (2) the applicant can demonstrate the ability to operate the school in an educationally and fiscally sound manner; (3) granting the application is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes set out in subdivision two of section twenty-eight hundred fifty of this article; and (4) granting the application would have a significant educational benefit to the students expected to attend the charter school, and the Board of Regents therefore approves the renewal application of the New Heights Academy Charter School and that a renewal charter be issued, and that its provisional charter be extended for a term up through and including June 30, 2025.

The motion passed. Regents Collins, Mittler, and Reyes abstained.

## Approval of the New York State (NYS) Physical Education Learning Standards (2020) [P-12 (A) 4]

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents approve the new NYS Physical Education Learning Standards, with the requirement that Department staff take the immediate next steps as outlined.

The motion passed unanimously.

# Proposed Addition of Part 122 to the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education Relating to Military Absentee Ballots for School District and School District Public Library Elections, Budget, and Referenda [P-12 (A) 5 Revised]

Your Committee recommends that the Board of Regents take the following action:

That Part 122 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education be added, as submitted, section 3.8(b) of the Rules of the Board of Regents be amended, as submitted, effective March 3, 2020, as an emergency action upon a finding by the Board of Regents that such action is necessary for the preservation of the general welfare to immediately conform the Regulations of the Commissioner of Educations to the requirements of Chapter 489 of the Laws of 2019, which requires military absentee ballots for school district and school district public library elections, budget, and referenda.

# WHAT ESSA REQUIRES STATES TO DO:



Adopt challenging State academic standards aligned with entrance requirements for creditbearing coursework in the system of public higher education in the State.



Establish high school graduation rate Long-term Goals and Measures of Interim Progress.



Establish a method to identify for Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) any high school that fails to graduate more than one-third of its students.



Use high school graduation rates as a part of the system to differentiate school performance and identify schools for Comprehensive or Targeted Support and Improvement.

# WHAT ESSA REQUIRES STATES TO DO:



Include on annual state and local report cards the high school graduation rates for all students and specified disaggregated groups of students.



Report for each public high school in the state, to the extent data are available, the rate at which students in the year following their high school graduation enroll in postsecondary institutions.

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Review the efficacy of funds provided to support charter school students, English language learners, homeless students, incarcerated youth, migrant students, and Native American students in assisting students to graduate high school.



Calculate, publicly report, and use for accountability purposes the Four-Year Adjusted Cohort Graduation Rate and Extended Year Adjusted Cohort Graduation Rates in accordance with detailed rules specified in the law.

# WHAT ESSA **DOES NOT** REQUIRE STATES TO DO:





## ESSA AND HIGH SCHOOL ASSESSMENTS:

ESSA requires that students be assessed on a reading and a math assessment at least once in grades 9-12 and at least once in science in grades 10-12. Most states meet these subject requirements by giving all students in a particular high school grade a statewide assessment, the results of which are not consequential for high school graduation.

ESSA permits school districts to substitute a nationally-recognized high school academic assessment if such exam has been approved by the State as meeting State academic content standards and other technical requirements.All students in the school district must participate in the locally selected examination.

States may also seek USDE permission to participate in the Innovative Assessment and Accountability Demonstration Program. (Four states approved to date.)



States have broad latitude in setting graduation standards.

# SUMMARY



Graduation results must be publicly reported and used for school accountability.

Students must be assessed at least once in high school in ELA, math, and science on Statewide assessments. There are some limited options for local assessments and demonstration pilots.



Changes in graduation standards would likely require amendments to the State ESSA plans in areas such as Long-term Goals and Measures of Interim Progress.
