### 2024-2025 Budget Environment

- Board of Regents provided a streamlined list of targeted asks
- Governor and Legislature supported most of the Regents requests



### School Aid Increase

### School Aid

#### Included

- Fully fund expense-based aids
- Operating Reorganization Aid Enhancement (2023-2024 Regents Request)

#### Not Included

- Growth Aid for districts with large enrollment increases
- Foundation Aid enhancements
- Enhanced CTE funding through BOCES and Special Services Aids
- Early College Program and Formula

- Preserve save harmless
- Inflation factor at 2.8%
- Maximum state share to 91%
- Environmental Bond Act funds cover local share of zero emission bus costs



## Capital Needs

#### Not Included

- \$19.1 million for department buildings (\$3.4 million provided)
- \$188.7 million for state owned schools, including nation schools (\$27.6 million provided)

#### Other Provisions

• Capital funding for 4201 State Supported Schools for the Blind and Deaf (\$30 million) was included.

# Supporting Department Operations

#### **Regent Priorities Included:**

- NYS Learning Standards Staff (4 literacy associate, 1 health)
- Zero Emission Bus Staff (3 staff)
- Funds to extend federally funded positions through the extended liquidation period
- Charter School Office funding to maintain staffing levels
- ITS Organizational Capacity (\$3.2 million) for 11 staff plus funds for licensing costs
- Statewide Longitudinal Data System 5 staff
- Office of Professions Modernization continued appropriation authority

### P-12 Initiatives

#### **Regents Priorities Included:**

- NYSESLAT Update (\$4 million)
- Exam Translations (\$500,000)
- Consolidation of three Prekindergarten Expansion Grants
- Corrected Prekindergarten conflicting supplant language
- Tuition Rate Setting Study (\$1.4 million request funded for two additional years)

#### **Regents Priorities Not Included:**

- Culturally Responsive and Sustaining Education funds (\$954,190)
- Statewide hybrid high school for students in Juvenile Justice settings
- Hold harmless for special ed programs with adults occupying student placements
- Tuition rate growth factor for special ed programs in statute
- Gather agencies to recommend approaches to expanding residential opportunities
- Enhanced Aid to support student with disabilities until age 22 (FAPE)

# P-12 Initiatives Cont.

- Additional funds for My Brother's Keeper (\$10 million increase)
- Holocaust educational materials (\$500,000)
- Financial Literacy educational materials (\$400,000)
- New Round of P-TECH and Early College High Schools (\$20 million)
- Funding for Monitors & Rochester Fiscal Consultant
- NYSUT and Learning Trust to deliver training to educators on evidence-based instructional practices (\$10 million)

# P-12 Initiatives Cont.

- Additional funding for STEM programming (\$2.5 million increase)
- Increases for Mandated Services Aid and Comprehensive Attendance Policy reimbursement (\$46.1 million increase)
- Academic Improvement Services (\$500,000 increase)
- Health and Safety Equipment Projects (\$25 million increase)
- New nonpublic arts program grants (\$5 million)

# P-12 Initiatives Cont.

- NYSED to issue statewide instructional best practices on teaching reading for Pre-K through Grade 3, on or before January 1, 2025, and each district must verify alignment of such
- Department directed to conduct a study of Pre-K funding and recommend modifications- due December 1, 2024
- Ensures school food authorities participating in both the NY Farm to School (30%) Program and Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) State Subsidy receive the full NY Farm to School Program subsidy amount for all lunches served
- Dissolves the Smart Schools Review Board and makes the Department the sole party in the review of and approval or rejection decisions of any remaining Smart Schools Investment Plan proposals.

# Higher Education

#### **Regents Priorities Included:**

 Opportunity Programs increased slightly (\$1.7 million across 4 programs)

#### **Regents Priorities Not included:**

- Teach.org Recruitment Pipeline (\$1.2 million for year one, \$3.7 million over three years)
- Higher Education enhanced supports and services for students with disabilities (held flat at \$4 million)

- Bundy Aid universities are only eligible if their total endowment is less than \$750 million and pro-rates apportionments to appropriation levels
- TAP eligibility income threshold raised, minimum award increased, and tuition credit extended

### ACCES

#### **Regents Priorities Included:**

- Federal appropriation increase for Social Security Account
- Updated appropriation language for Adult Literacy Education

### Cultural Education

#### Regents Priorities Included

- NOVELny (\$3 million)
- Library Aid (\$4.2 million increase)
- Library Construction Aid (\$44 million of \$45 million requested)
- Summer School for the Arts (\$1.2 million of \$2 million requested)
- Increase for Talking Book and Braille Library Materials (\$235,000 increase)

#### Regents Priorities Not Included

Cultural Education Stabilization \$10 fee or appropriation (\$17 million)

- Capital for the cultural education center (\$10 million)
- Imagination Library Program matching grants (\$500,000)

### Professions

- Does not authorize New York to join the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact and the Nurse Licensure Compact
- No changes to scope of practice for Physician Assistants, Registered Professional Nurses, Medical Assistants, Dentists, Dental Hygienists, Pharmacists
- No change to Emergency Medical Services

# Other Provisions:

# Mayoral Control in NYC

- Two-year extension
- New member on Board of Education to serve as chair
- City must receive an audit to demonstrate compliance with:
  - Maintenance of Effort requirement
  - Foundation aid increases do not supplant local funds

# Other Provisions:

## Federal Student Aid Forms

- Each school district must ensure all high school seniors have completed either the FAFSA, New York State DREAM Act application, or submitted a waiver
- Districts must report annually the total number of students under each category beginning July 1, 2025
- Districts must notify each high school senior about scholarships and aid available at least twice a year
- Students will not be penalized or punished if they do not fulfill the requirements of this law, and it will not affect a student's ability to graduate.
